PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Motion by Mr. Ali to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of January 24, MINUTES 2023. Seconded by Mr. Grech. APPROVED

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, MINUTES APPROVED

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COMMUNICATIONS

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Ms. Rose Welch, 6753 Cedarwood Trace, said with summer coming, the deer are unbelievable and are killing everything that she puts outside from the inside. She asked who she could contact in Columbus to reimburse her for everything that gets destroyed.

Mr. Bortolotto said that is a big problem for northeast Ohio, it isn't just a Middleburg Heights problem. He confirmed with Mr. Herron that the metroparks does the deer culling.

Mr. Herron said they do culling in the Mill Stream Run area in Strongsville.

Mayor Castelli said we are fortunate from the standpoint that we do have the metroparks that comes right through the center of our community. He said culling operations do happen in this general area. Mayor Castelli said they could look into to see how far up and down the metroparks they are going, and would be happy to get back to Ms. Welch to let her know what their process is and how it impacts the general area.

Mr. Ference added that this was discussed in committee a few years ago. He said the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the metroparks gave a presentation on how severe the problem is and what could be done about it. Mr. Ference said as he understands it the culling that takes place in the metroparks, deals with the problems there. He said but what they learned from that meeting and other regional meetings, is that the problem we have within the city is deer that breed and live in the city.

Mr. McGregor said as ODNR stated, there needs to be a certain amount of acreage before bow hunters, or shooters can come in. He said within a smaller community with lower acreage homes, the liability is huge and would be very difficult to do within this city. 6

Mr. Ali suggested looking into deer repellant sprays that do also work.

8 Mr. Robert White, 13540 Indian Creek Drive, asked the mayor for an update on the Indian Creek sewer project. 10

Mayor Castelli said there was a meeting last week with our stormwater consultant. He said our engineers are looking at some of the information that came out of that meeting. Mayor Castelli said he is hoping within the next week or so to have a game plan. He said we are looking at some alternatives. Mayor Castelli said as you know, the cost for the relief sewer has gone extremely high. He said we did bid the project, but no one bid and it has become a very costly project. Mayor Castelli said we are looking at two options and are waiting to get that information finalized. He said when he gets more information, he will reach out to Mr. White to walk through it.

Dr. Conrad Lindes, 13375 Old Pleasant Valley, referred to NOPEC grant legislation on the agenda, and had a few questions that he was hoping could be addressed when that legislation is discussed. Dr. Lindes asked for the grant amount, how much the grant is going to cost utility rate payers in Middleburg Heights so NOPEC has the money to pay the grant, what is the grant going to be used for and what would the city do if it doesn't get the grant.

Mr. Bortolotto introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-8, An Ordinance to make supplemental appropriations for current expenditures and expenses for the City of Middleburg Heights for the calendar year 2023 and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ference.

ADOPTED SUPPLEMENTAL. APPROPRIATIONS

ORD. 2023-8

Mr. Bortolotto said these appropriations and expenditures were discussed in committee last Monday. He said the police cruiser replacements and two dump truck bodies cost more than anticipated and budgeted. Mr. Bortolotto asked Mr. Stewart to explain the additional \$46,000 (insurance reimbursement - Signal

Mr. Stewart said on New Year's Eve, the traffic control box at the corner of Smith Road and Big Creek Parkway was hit by a driver. He said this is for the replacement of that traffic control box, which has already been submitted to our insurance company. Mr. Stewart said they will submit the claim to the driver's insurance company.

Mr. Bortolotto said this will be a wash, as the city will receive the \$46,000 back from the insurance company.

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, ORDINANCE NO. 2023-8 ADOPTED

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Mr. Bortolotto introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-9, An Ordinance authorizing the mayor to enter into a contract extension with Senior Transportation 1 Connection of Cuyahoga County for Senior Transportation Services and declaring an emergency and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Meany. 3

Mr. Bortolotto said this was discussed at our committee meeting. He said this went from \$7,300 per month to \$8,000 per month. Mr. Bortolotto said this is used by our seniors, and is a great benefit for those that really need it.

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, ORDINANCE NO. 2023-9 ADOPTED

Mr. Bortolotto introduced RESOLUTION NO. 2023-10, A Resolution

authorizing the mayor and finance director to enter into a contract with Leswego Corporation - Anglin Equipment and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. McGregor.

14 Mr. Bortolotto said this was discussed in committee as well. He said the service department has an apparatus that washes the undercarriage of our vehicles that is 16 broken and needs replaced. Mr. Bortolotto said the purchase price for this piece 17 of equipment is \$38,000. 18

19 Mr. McGregor added that Mr. Herron said how bad the salt deteriorates these 20 trucks, and this machine lasted at least 20 years. He said it is imperative to have 21 this replaced, just for the longevity of the vehicles.

Mr. Bortolotto said this may seem like an unusual tool, but it does give longevity 23 to our trucks and vehicles.

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, RESOUTION NO. 2023-10 ADOPTED

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Mr. Bortolotto introduced RESOLUTION NO. 2023-11, A Resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into an agreement with Midwest Land Clearing. Inc. for the Abram Creek Detention Basin 3 Project and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ference.

Mr. Bortolotto said this was discussed in committee as well. He said he is elated that we are proposing this and moving forward to cut down the trees. Mr. Bortolotto said he has been on council for many years, and is glad we are moving forward by cutting these trees before that bats have their say.

Mr. Ference said this is another major visible step in the solution that the administration has proposed to solve the flooding problems on Big Creek Parkway. He said up until now there have been a lot of questions, but now people driving up and down the parkway will see results and progress. Mr. Ference said he is really happy to see this progress.

Mr. Herron thanked the mayor and council for their support. He said a construction drive will be put in on Pearl Road. Mr. Herron said they are working with Fabrizi for a quote to put in proper stones, so dirt doesn't get all over the road. He said you may see that even by the end of the week, and there will be proper signage too so people understand. Mr. Herron said there will be some people that don't want to see the trees cleared, but he wants everyone to understand why this is being done. He said trees will be planted around the basins once they are in. Mr. Herron said lastly, they received their Ohio EPA permit, which is important and are finishing up details with the Army Corps of Engineers. Mr. Ali said that is a lot of trees, and a very good price for that work.

Mr. Bortolotto said for years, Mr. Ali was beating the drum for the dog park and for years, we have been beating the drum to try to stop/slow down this flooding. He commended the administration for putting their efforts and their focus on getting the dog park done, and getting the flooding resolved.

Mr. Herron said the exciting part obviously, is the project will be put out to bid and then council will hopefully be able to consider the proposals, and

Mr. Bortolotto introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-12, An Ordinance repealing existing Chapter 747 of the Middleburg Heights Codified Ordinances entitled "Mechanical and Electronic Amusement Devices and Game Rooms" and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Sage.

ORD. 2023-12 ADOPTED REPEAL CODIFIED CHAPTER 747

Mr. Bortolotto said this was discussed at the finance committee meeting last Monday. He said we amended and repealed existing Chapter 747, which is no longer needed. 12

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, ORDINANCE NO. 2023-12 ADOPTED

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Mr. Bortolotto introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-13. An Ordinance authorizing all actions necessary to accept a Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC) 2023 Energized Community Grant and declaring an emergency and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Meany.

ORD. 2023-13 ADOPTED ACCEPT NOPEC GRANT

Mr. Bortolotto said this was discussed in committee and asked Mr. Stewart to 19 20 address the questions that Dr. Lindes asked.

Mr. Stewart said this is a grant that the city receives each year from NOPEC. He said this year, the grant is for \$49,474. Mr. Stewart said we have used this grant in the past to do a number of window upgrades, as well as, HVAC upgrades throughout the city campus. He said we envision using this current grant to finalize the windows here at city hall, which are the ones surrounding us here. Mr. Stewart said that would complete all of the windows. He said the grant amount is given to each community, based on a dollar amount and the number of people that are included in the NOPEC programs. Mr. Stewart said if we were not to receive this program, we would have to come up with the funds to finish the windows from our general fund. He said this offsets the costs to our taxpayers to be able to do this.

Mr. Bortolotto asked Dr. Lindes if he had any additional questions.

35 Dr. Lindes asked if it was x number of dollars for each utility payer or is it a percent of the bill. 37

Mr. Stewart said it is x number of dollars based on the number of people enrolled in the program.

Dr. Lindes asked who pays those dollars.

Mr. Stewart said a contract is negotiated with the energy provider. He said he could provide Dr. Lindes with the exact numbers what they are per resident.

Mr. Meany introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-14. An Ordinance authorizing the mayor to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cuyahoga Soil 3 and Water Conservation District (SWCD) to carry out mandated responsibilities related to the NPDES Storm Water Permit and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. McGregor.

RES. 2023-14 ADOPTED ENTER MOU -CUYAHOGA SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Mr. Meany said Cuyahoga Soil and Water provides technical assistance in helping Middleburg Heights carry out its mandated responsibilities to promote best practices for pollution prevention and corresponds with the city's municipal separate storm sewer system permit. 12

Mr. McGregor asked if this addresses septic systems that are bad in the city.

Mr. Herron said this does not. He said they check our construction sites, and 14 check all the storm water basins and review construction and storm water plans for new development sites. Mr. Herron said we also consult with them too on 16 other storm water issues. He said they provide an annual report that we have to 17 submit to the Ohio EPA every year, that is called an MS4 report. Mr. Herron said 18 19 each city has to get a storm sewer license to discharge waters in the state of Ohio. 20 He said the Board of Health is responsible for monitoring septic systems. Mr. 21 Herron said he and Mr. Meany have discussed having the Board of Health come 22 back in to talk about septic systems again.

23 Mr. Ference confirmed with Mr. Herron that the city has to pass the water 24 standards of all the discharge that comes out of the city.

Mr. Herron said we receive an annual permit from the Ohio EPA, and a report 27 needs to be done annually regarding the monitoring of construction sites, etc.

28 Mr. Ference said this ordinance allows us to partner with them to make sure we 29 are doing the right things so we can pass that. 30

Mr. Herron said that is correct.

Mr. Ali referred to the MOU and asked Mr. Herron if every street storm drain is 32 33 checked.

34 Mr. Herron said no, they do not check storm drains. He said we go out annually 35 and clean 14 of our catch basins. Mr. Herron said the detention basins are 36 checked, and if they are deficient, letters are sent to follow-up. 37

Mr. Ali asked if the Vac Truck takes care of the catch basins. 38

Mr. Herron said yes it does. He said we very rarely have catch basin issues like 39 40 in the past.

Mayor Castelli said the benefit of this, is that they are experts that we can go to that are handling this. He said otherwise, we would have to hire people and do this ourselves, while making sure we are doing it properly. Mayor Castelli said that is why communities of our size want to partner with organizations that have the resources to do this type of work. He said over the last couple years, the city has rectified some of the worst illicit discharges.

Mr. Herron said there are a lot of eyes looking at these projects, making sure that the storm water work is done right.

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ZONING & BUILDING CODE COMMITTEE - MR. GRECH, CHAIRMAN

Mr. Grech placed ORDINANCE NO. 2023-6, An Ordinance approving the proposed zoning code edits submitted by Stewart Land Use on SECOND READING.

ORD. 2023-6 SECOND READING

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Mayor Castelli introduced RESOLUTION NO. 2023-15, A Resolution accepting the FY2021 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and moved to adopt. On behalf of the mayor, Mr. Bortolotto MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Grech.

Mayor Castelli said this grant is funded through FEMA. He said this was back in actually 2021, when we were working on getting this particular grant. Mayor

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Castelli said the grant is for the purchase of five new cardiac monitors for our vehicles. He said this is different from an AED because it transmits directly to the emergency room. Mayor Castelli said it is a diagnostic grade EKG. He said doctors at the emergency room can better prepare for the patient because the information is sent to them while they are being transported. Mayor Castelli said these monitors can take repeated blood pressures, temperature, monitor CO2 levels, monitors how well someone is breathing, provides different levels of shock therapy, etc. He said we have these in the vehicles now, but they are older and the equipment cannot be replaced if they go bad. Mayor Castelli said this was one of the items that was placed in our five-year capital plan. He said the good news is that we received a grant in the amount of \$190,000 to replace those monitors. Mayor Castelli said the city will be responsible for providing \$9,000 and FEMA will cover \$181,000 to replace these monitors.

Mr. Ali asked if the old monitors could be sold.

Mayor Castelli said we could talk to the chief as to what could be done with the old monitors.

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, RESOLUTION NO. 2023-15 ADOPTED

Mayor Castelli introduced RESOLUTION NO. 2023-16, A Resolution authorizing the engagement of Weston Hurd, LLP to provide legal services in regard to labor, employment and other legal services and moved to adopt. On behalf of the mayor, Mr. Bortolotto MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ali. Mayor Castelli said the city uses multiple different law firms for employment, labor and legal services. He said Mr. Max Rieker, was previously with Walter Haverfield, who is our main labor law attorney, and have also used other individuals from the employment law team at Walter Haverfield. Mayor Castelli said they made a transition with their firm, where they are focusing more on real estate law and other types of practices. He said they basically sold their employment law practice to a new firm, Weston Hurd. Mayor Castelli said Mr. Rieker is now working with Weston Hurd, so a new services agreement is needed with them. He said there aren't any changes or increases to Mr. Rieker's fees.

Mayor Castelli introduced RESOLUTION NO. 2023-17, A Resolution authorizing the mayor and finance director to enter into an agreement with Osborn Engineering for the Smith Road Re-Alignment, Stormsewer and Resurfacing Improvement Project. On behalf of the mayor, Mr. Bortolotto moved for suspension of Charter Section 4.10 (5 day delivery requirement) and Council Rule 3 (24 hour agenda requirement). Seconded by Mr. Meany.

ROLL CALL: YEAS 7, NAYS 0, RULES SUSPENDED

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45 Mayor Castelli moved to adopt.

On behalf of the mayor, Mr. Bortolotto MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ference

Mayor Castelli said both this piece of legislation and the next piece of legislation were discussed at the finance committee meeting. He said this is the remainder of Smith Road to do the resurfacing, as well as storm sewer and re-alignment work that will also be done. Mayor Castelli said that resurfacing is with the county, and is excited that this project will be moving forward. He said estimates were given as to what the engineering costs would be, and the good news is this came in under the estimates that were given to you. Mayor Castelli said the total design fee for the project is \$247,888.00.

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Mr. Herron said more details regarding the work will be discussed at the next streets committee meeting. He said Osborn will forward their plans to the county, and then they will prepare the bid process. Mr. Herron said legislation will be needed to enter into a contract with the county for this work.

Mayor Castelli said this project is a multi-million dollar project and we are very excited that the county will be paying for 70-80 percent, at least the resurfacing part. He said we think it makes sense to look at re-aligning that street because of the curve in front of Rivals, making it a little safer. Mayor Castelli said they also found some storm sewer issues and replacements needed there. He said they want to get all of that work done while they are doing the resurfacing project.

Mr. Ference said this is a significant improvement for all users of Smith Road.
He said one of the biggest questions that he receives as a ward three councilman, is what can be done to make Smith Road a little smoother. Mr. Ference said realigning that curve will be a significant safety improvement.

Mr. Herron said he will provide some better pictures. He said the sewer district brought to our attention that there are some sewers from Wood Creek down to Stroud that are poor and undersized, with rusting culverts.

18 Mr. Ference asked if this will impact the proposed retention basin for that area.

Mr. Herron said it will not. He said they worked closely with Osborn and the Regional Sewer District at the end of last summer. Mr. Herron said this will not impact this project. He said the road work will be done, and then the detention project will be done.

Mr. McGregor thanked the decision makers on this. He said he knew from Mr. Meany when Middlebrook was done, and we had to go back in looking at the sewers to repair some things and repave. Mr. McGregor said it was like the cart was before the horse on that, and then we discovered that. He said doing this now, is essential before the road gets put in, so we have that assurance that we don't have to go back in and dig it up.

Mr. Meany said he just had a discussion with a constituent about the widening, or possibly a turning lane being added. He said he explained that the right-of-way was an issue, water lines, sewer lines, utilities, moving of poles and things of that nature. Mr. Meany didn't know if there was anything that could be added.

Mayor Castelli said the city has been working with the county regarding funding the resurfacing, that discussion came up with them as to if a third lane (turning lane) to help with traffic, and from their prospective as well as ours, we need to get the resurfacing done no matter what. He said even if we ended up saying that today we are going to do this widening and do that project, they said it would probably take between seven and ten years to get that done. Mayor Castelli said we want the resurfacing done first, because there is no question that it is needed. He said then we are going to continue to look at this, but that is going to be a project that is going to take a lot of time because there isn't a lot of right-of-way, so there will be a lot of purchasing of property. Mayor Castelli said that potentially is a future project.

Mr. Herron said the traffic counts were looked at, and he said he knows there are certain times of the day obviously with school and school buses that contributes, but beyond that it is a limited 15 minutes here or there. He said it really isn't a street to put the time and effort to hire a real estate firm to get more public right-of-way. Mr. Herron said you would have to spend a lot of money, and you're not going to get much more value, it isn't going to help traffic that much more.

Mr. Ali said this is probably the trickiest turn in the entire city and is looking forward to see what the engineers come up with. He said he believes this is the last main artery in the city to be repaved. Mr. Ali said kudos to everyone to get this done and tackled.

Mr. Herron said city council was very helpful in helping us purchase that parcel for the sewer district because now it aligns us to realign this road and it is our land. He said this will allow us to do the realignment and will be a great safety enhancement.

Mayor Castelli said this was discussed with city council at the finance committee meeting. He said at that time, we had estimates but the good news here as well, is that the numbers came in under our estimate. Mayor Castelli said the total number for the engineering as well as the planning services will be \$395,531. He said this came in under the \$500,000, which was estimated. Mayor Castelli thanked Osborn Engineering, as they were asked to go back and sharpen their pencils, which they did.

Mr. Sage asked if this part of Smith Road will be in coordination with the legislation we just passed.

Mayor Castelli said we will work on figuring out how everything will come

Mayor Castelli said we will work on figuring out how everything will come together, because we don't know exactly when the resurfacing will take place. He said we will have to coordinate how that comes together.

30 said we will have to coordinate now that comes together.
31 Mr. Herron said he would anticipate Smith Road between Sheldon Road and Pearl to be first, but as the mayor said it depends when the bids come in, etc.

Mayor Castelli said there will be discussions with council to review this. He said there are things to be done on the Southland side in 2024 like the multi-purpose trail and things like that. Mayor Castelli said the good thing is that Osborn Engineering is doing both projects, and we feel that will be extremely helpful.

Mr. Grech said he wasn't sure how to go about this, as to if both council's approval is needed, or if the mayor's approve or even possibly the Board of Director's at Woodvale. He said he didn't know if he wants to purchase land, but he wants to put his own family mausoleum at Woodvale. Mr. Grech asked Mr. Incorvaia for his input.

Mayor Castelli asked if Mr. Milano wants to pay for a mausoleum.

Mr. Grech said he would pay for everything, it wouldn't cost us a penny.

Mr. Incorvaia said he would be happy to go over that with Mr. Grech.

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MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Castelli said moving the police station over has been happening for the past week or two. He said they will officially be operating out of the new police station tomorrow at 1:00 p.m.

Mr. Downey said there was a great deal of camaraderie that came to the table in the form of all the policemen and policewomen wanting to help make this move.
