  - Mr. Herron said we could bid it if we went through cooperative purchasing, but he said the last two times, Reilly Sweeping outbid Southwest Sweeping. He also said when we bid, it's another \$2,500 for legal advertising.
  - Mr. Stewart said the cooperative purchasing programs do a public bidding process. He said their process ended up with Reilly Sweeping winning the bid being the lowest and the best. Mr. Stewart said ORC allows us to cooperate with and enter the contracts they have already bid out.

On behalf of the mayor, Mr. Bortolotto MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ference.

Mayor Castelli said this ordinance is to make supplemental appropriations for current expenditures and expenses for the City of Middleburg Heights for the calendar year 2023 in the amount of \$40,000. He said as you know, we have been working with Mackay Engineering and R2O, the storm water management consultant, over the last couple of years. Mayor Castelli said this consulting group did the comprehensive analysis of our city years a few years ago, identifying four of the main flooding areas, but said there are actually five if you include Big Creek Parkway. He said a lot of work was already done on Big Creek Parkway, so they went through the rest of the city and identified those additional main focuses when we have high rain events. Mayor Castelli said plans are in place for three of those areas already, and this would be the last area that we would like to get more details on. He said they want to add some flow monitoring so we can get additional analysis that can help us decide what needs to be done. Mayor Castelli said the main focus is going to be on the Elderdale/Farnum area, but we are also going to cast a wider net looking at some additional areas in the city with this supplemental. He said we were going to present this in September, but thought it made sense to move this up so we can get started a little earlier.

Mr. Ali thanked the mayor for taking charge, helping everybody out. He said every one of them was bombarded on Thursday. Mr. Ali said he was on the phone until midnight, which was exhausting. He said he couldn't believe how high the water was, adding that it wasn't only Middleburg Heights, it was everywhere.

Mayor Castelli said he has the rainfall statistics from the Regional Sewer District from that storm. He said usually we talk about a 100-year rain event that we get concerned about, adding that we had a 200-year rain event for a 30 minute period of time. Mayor Castelli said we are on our way already on a variety of implementation plans that we have in place for flooding initiatives and look forward to expanding that.

Mr. Herron asked if the mayor wanted to talk about Indian Creek.

Mayor Castelli said Indian Creek is one of the main flooding areas, and said the city has been working on getting grants. He said we were selected as one of the potential projects for Max Miller's district. Mayor Castelli said at this point in time, the house has approved a \$1.25 million dollar grant for Indian Creek. He said this has to get through the senate process, before a bill is signed. Mayor Castelli said at this point, it looks very promising. He said if we get that grant, we will be able to move forward in 2024. Mayor Castelli said he appreciated Mr. Ali's help. He said the sewer district also expanded the amount of money that they were giving us for Indian Creek, and he said that was approximately \$2.2 million dollars. Mayor Castelli said a lot of analysis is being done with the county for Belmeadow. He said we are looking to line a portion of the sewers in that region this year, and will finish all of the lining next year. Mayor Castelli said then some flow monitoring devices will be installed for a couple months to see how the lining has impacted that area, which will determine what type of relief sewer would be needed, the size of it, or if one is needed at all. He said they suspect that a smaller relief sewer will be needed after this work is done, which would be done the following year. Mayor Castelli said the good news is that we have a lot of projects in the works, we are moving forward and hope to get these things done as soon as possible before those next storms.

Mr. Ference said when you get a storm like we had last Thursday, the whole city becomes a flood area. He said we have talked about a few other places, like Old Pleasant Valley and said now he is getting a lot of complaints from Smith Road. Mr. Ference said going forward, perhaps this is something we could put on the agenda for Mackay and R2O to look at what should be done there.
