Mr. Herron said council expressed to go out and bid locally, and he talked to the salt consortium group. He said we are partnering with six other cities, which was put out for bid for gasoline and diesel fuel. Mr. Herron said this has been a great consortium to work with, and the best part is that we got good pricing out of it.

Mr. Bortolotto asked if the best pricing was through the consortium.

Mr. Herron said yes, it is even better than Sourcewell's pricing and he is very happy with this. He said the contract will start January 1, 2024.

Mr. Ali asked if we know the price per gallon right now.

Mr. Herron gave an example as to what happens and said we would get the OPIS price, which is the open market price, and then they will price it .0373 under the OPIS price. He explained that is how fuel is bid.

Mr. Ali questioned in the past that our contracts would be per gallon.

Mr. Stewart said it was always based off of the OPIS index. He said when we awarded the contract we used that date that it was awarded, but it always fluctuated based on OPIS index plus whatever factor they applied to it.

Mr. Ali asked how long the contract was for. 10

Mr. Herron said this contract would be for two years. 11

Mr. Bortolotto said it is very normal for many cities to buy underneath the 13 consortium.

Mr. Ali asked if a supplier didn't bid on diesel, if that means they don't offer it.

Mr. Herron said that could be, or they pulled the bid documents and didn't submit

27 Mr. Ali referred to diesel fuel and said it they are selling it to us minus .03 cents 28 how are they making money.

Mr. Stewart said the OPIS index is indexed priced based on market value of gas at 30 that point and time. He said that index still has profit built in to that margin. 31

Mr. Ali asked if the profits are already built in for the consortium.

Mr. Stewart said the consortium is six cities, partnering on a bid. 33

34 Mr. Herron said the consortium works for anything you can get a bulk price on. He said it works for gas, salt, etc.

Mr. Ali asked how our tanks were.

Mr. Herron said our tanks are in great condition, and they are checked every year. 38

He said the city is held to the same standards as a Speedway or any other gas 39 40

41 Mr. Ali asked how old our tanks were, saying that would be a hefty expense to 42 replace. 43

Mr. Herron said they are fairly old. He said the tanks at the service center are approximately 23 years old, but the fiberglass is a much better product, adding 45 that the old tanks used to be steel.

Mr. Ference said he appreciates all that Mr. Herron does to get to this pricing. He said it would be easier to just do the same old thing. Mr. Ference said every penny adds up.

Mr. Bortolotto introduced ORDINANCE NO. 2023-99, An Ordinance declaring the improvement to certain parcels of real property within the city to be a public purpose and exempt from taxation pursuant to ORC 5709.40(B); providing for the collection and deposit of service payments and specifying the purposes for which those service payments may be expended; specifying the public infrastructure improvements directly benefiting the parcels; and declaring an emergency and MOVED TO ADOPT. Seconded by Mr. Ference.

ORD. 2023-99 ADOPTED IMPROVE CERTAIN PARCELS TO BE A PUBLIC PURPOSE AND EXEMPT FROM TAXATION ( SERPENTINI PROPERTY - TIF)

Mr. Bortolotto confirmed that this is the TIF for the Serpentini property.

Mr. Bichara said the city has the ability to apply TIF to certain properties. He said this does not impact the funding for the Berea City Schools or Polaris Career Center at all. Mr. Bichara said this would be for capturing funds from those tax dollars to be used for public improvements in the area.

Mr. Bortolotto made a motion authorizing the mayor to enter into a subrecipient agreement with Cuyahoga Land Bank and to enter into any other agreements or sign any documents related to the Ohio Department of Development Brownfield Remediation Program grant application for the redevelopment of 6950 West 130th Street in the Southland Shopping Center Business District. Seconded by Mr. McGregor.

MOTION 2023-33 ENTER INTO A SUBRECIPIENT AGREEMENT WITH CUYAHOGA LAND BANK

21 Mayor Castelli said as you know, we have submitted a Brownfield Grant for the remediation and demo of the Sear's building that is going through the County 23 Land Bank. He said this allows us to be a subrecipient of that grant if we are 24 awarded that through the state.

Mr. Bichara said the process this year is that the moneys from the state will be awarded to the Cuyahoga Land Bank. He said we have submitted an application 28 and are well positioned, and we believe our application is a priority application. Mr. Bichara said for any recipient, meaning the city, they would have to execute a 30 subrecipient agreement between the Land Bank and the city to actually have the funds come to us.

Mr. Ali said he knows nothing is ever guaranteed, but asked what percentage he felt we were at to obtain funds.

Mr. Bichara said he and the mayor have been in constant contact with the Land Bank. He said a tremendous amount of work has been done, and we submitted all the required documents. Mr. Bichara said this is the final piece to be submitted to have a final application. He said we previously submitted everything based on what the Land Bank thought would be needed for this. Mr. Bichara said as of today, they came up with some additional, minor information that would be needed. He said this is one of the last pieces of the puzzle, and he believes we are very well positioned.

Mr. Ali asked Mr. Bichara if he knew how many other projects we were competing against.

Mr. Bichara said he didn't know. He said he knew that the priority is based on two things, the way you submit the application and we were number two, and how complete your application was and we were number one, and if it is considered a priority application by the county. Mr. Bichara said he believes it is considered a priority application by the county. He said incidentally we were number two in submitting this application because we had such a complete application it took us that long to submit it.

Mr. Bortolotto commended Mr. Bichara for being on top of this. He said that will be a phenomenal project.

Mr. Bichara said we have put in everything for remediation and clearing, so based on our environmental consultant, it is coming up with a number in the five million dollar range.

Mr. Ali asked if they can come back and offer something else, like instead of five million offer us three million.

Mr. Bichara said anything is possible, but for the grant that we are going for, the maximum allowable is ten million, but obviously you would have to have a budget for that, you can't just ask for ten million.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

Mr. Bichara said we have previously spoken about the grant that was awarded to Polaris Career Center. He said they were one of 35 awardees chosen for a Career Technical Construction grant from the state of Ohio. Mr. Bichara said they were the largest recipient in northeast Ohio, and one of the largest in the state, being awarded \$11.6 million dollars. He said they will use these funds to create programs in what they call their new ERA program (Engineering, Robotics and Automation). Mr. Bichara said there will actually be a physical expansion to their building of 20,000 square feet, which is three times the size of the current Polaris commons area. He said the new lab and classroom space will house not only the physical equipment used there, but also they will be able to expand not only for high school students but also for adult education as well. Mr. Bichara said in addition, Polaris is now collaborating with Southwest General Health Center on a new LPN training and certification program to increase the number of trained nurses in the area. He said they are also working on an RN training program as well. Mr. Bichara said in April, the mayor provided a letter of support which we feel was instrumental in helping them demonstrate to the state the need for this
